## Marché Croque St-Roch Ouebec City

In a socially and economically disadvantaged neighbourhood, the Marché solidaire Croque St-Roch provides assistance that complements the food aid network. It helps provide physical and financial access to fresh, healthy food while supporting food dignity. It is a socially mixed project conducted by and for the community.

## Centre-Femmes La Passerelle

#### Lower St. Lawrence

Immigrant women in the Kamouraska region face tall hurdles when they arrive. This project addresses the significant needs in the community by developing a network in which immigrant women can connect with each other. Reaching out directly to immigrant families helps break down cultural, personal and institutional barriers. Centre-Femmes is a local resource centre run by and for women. It is a place where Kamouraska women of all ages can belong, transition, break out of isolation, and find an education and action network. Mission Inclusion is pleased to support this project which promotes the inclusion of newcomer families, as there are very few local resources adapted to their needs.

It uses a variety of means to reach the most vulnerable people, particularly seniors.

Mission inclusion backs projects that meet the needs identified by the community. This project supported by several community organizations in the Saint-Roch neighbourhood is a good example.

### "Project to Improve the Exercise of the Right to Sexual and Reproductive Health" (PACIT) Haïti

PACIT is a project conducted by Mission Inclusion, Social Justice Connection and the Institut haïtien de santé communautaire (INHSAC) in the communes of Léogâne and Gressier in Haiti's Ouest department. It has two components. The first aims to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of community action and civil society in Léogâne and Gressier, particularly the efforts of women and adolescent girls, youth and women's groups, and to

defend sexual and reproductive health rights. The second supports civil society efforts to open a dialogue on sexual and reproductive health and rights with political leaders, health institution administrators in the two communes, and the communal health coordination body (Unité Communale de santé), and to increase the accountability of these institutions to the community.

This project also supports the Haitian Ministry of Public Health and Population (MSPP) in implementing the National Health Policy of 2012, the National Sexual and Reproductive Health Strategic

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The FCCP has created an alternative economy which enables women to obtain food for themselves and their families. Approximately 700 women at 28 "mothers' centres" in the Periférica district of La Paz are able to acquire food during 10 months of the year through a savings-based credit system.

Every week, each member makes a deposit in the account of the centre to which she belongs. The money is used to buy food and at the end of the year the fund yields a financial surplus, thanks to the collective efforts of the women who belong to the mothers' centre.
